

Climate Alliance's Commitments

Climate Alliance

Reduction of CO₂ emissions by 10% every 5 years and halving per capita emissions by 2030 (from a 1990 baseline)

 \rightarrow Climate Alliance is the only **European local government** network with a quantitative target

Cooperation with the indigenous peoples from the Amazon for the protection of the tropical rainforests

\rightarrow Climate Alliance members take global responsibility


Climate Alliance resolution on a strong and ambitious EU 2030 framework for climate and energy policies (40% increase in EE and 40% RE share) adopted in May 2014.



Paris – a huge step forward

- Paris doesn't guarantee anything, it improved the probabilities






Climate Alliance

CO2 reduction guiding variable



















Combination of actors and drivers

- Bottom-up: Social movements, local governments, civil society, global middleand upper-class, grassroots innovators and entrepreneurs.








Fig. 8 - Emissioni di CO₂ totali del territorio nel Comune di Città di Castello (con fattori LCA) suddivise per settori di consumo (1990-2010)




